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How does one go about winning WOTW two weeks in a row?* Well, winning an Olympic medal two weeks in a row doesn't hurt your chances.

Jemima Montag (VIC), teaming up with VRWC clubmate **Rhydian Cowley** for the inaugural staging of the Olympic Mixed Marathon Relay walk, took full advantage of Rhydian's efforts to place her – twice – within striking position of the lead and, eventually, the medals. (For her part, Jemima put Rhyd ahead at the 2nd change.)

Displaying none of the self-doubt she felt in the 20km, **Jemima** walked as if knowing she had the measure of her opponents as she twice reeled them back in. Overtaking Palmisano (ITA) and taking ground off Morejon (ECU) while holding Garcia Leon (PER) at bay in that final leg, she was never going to relinquish the bronze she and Rhydian had worked so hard for.

Rhydian, at his third Olympics and with the proposed 35km (and his chances of medalling in it) axed, exploited to perfection the new level of speed he had developed over the Australian summer. Drifting from the lead back to 4th but no further, determined to give Jemima a good launching pad, he set his sights on Stano (ITA) and handed over 20secs behind the Italians ... eminently gettable.

Rhyd's father, Robert, had some interesting stats on his son's performance:

"Rhydian walked out of his skin. He had recovered well from the 20km, like he had just blown the cobwebs out. The first 10km of each of his two legs added up to 77min 57sec, 36 seconds faster than his 20km pb. His first leg of 11.4km was walked at very close to his 10,000m pb pace. His final leg of 10km was 4th fastest of all walkers, bettered only by Martin, Pintado and Stano (just), these three being the current world champion, the current Olympic champion, and the previous Olympic champion."

Congratulations, Rhydian and Jemima. You embraced a format that is as yet far from universally accepted, that could have

been a credibility minefield, and helped make it an engrossing contest - something every Olympic competition should be!

*Honourable mentions

- Declan Tingay (WA) and Bec Henderson (VIC) sadly, the stars just didn't align for our second Relay pairing in Paris, seeing them finish 22nd. But all credit to them for their commitment and determination to fight on in the green and gold.
- Ela Uzun (VIC) smashed Jemima Montag's VRWC U14 record with a 1:23 PB time of 23:54.
- Sebastian Richards (SA) a huge 48 sec PB of 23:04 for 5km at South Parklands in Adelaide.

VRWC AV Country & VRWC Club c'ships, 11 August – Middle Park

A fine Sunday morning which, unfortunately, attracted only 3 of Victoria's country walkers for their State championships. On the bright side, one of them was Rio Olympian **Rachel Tallent**, making her first appearance at Middle Park since 2012. Many of us will remember the gripping battles in School and Junior championships between Rachel and Amy Burren, with neither giving an inch as each tried to wear the other down. Occupied nowadays with a busy professional life and thus short of training, Rachel's signature technique was nevertheless a welcome sight on the Aughtie Drive loop. We hope to see more of it

Sunshine is what you're supposed to make hay in and our younger walkers didn't disappoint, returning a club record and eleven PBs. **Ela Uzun** celebrated Jemima Montag's Olympic success by blasting her U14 5km record off the books by almost a minute with a sub-24:00 time of **23:54**. The most exciting racing this season has been in the U12s, with **Pippa Read** and **Addison Frenken** locked in battle most weeks. They continued the rivalry over 2km on Sunday with big PBs to Pippa (by 0:21), Addi (0:17) and **Indigo Marshall-Moodie** who clocked her first sub-11:00 2km with a 36 sec improvement.

All four of our U10 starters scored PBs in an encouraging showing, with **Payton Welsh** again taking a scythe to her previous best with her first ever sub-6:00 1km.

Martin and Perez win inaugural Olympic marathon race walk mixed relay for Spain in Paris

World 20km race walk champions **Alvaro Martin** and **Maria Perez** teamed up to win gold for Spain in the marathon race walk mixed relay at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games on Wednesday (7).

Competing in the newest athletics discipline on the Olympic programme, the Spanish duo clocked **2:50:31** to earn their second medals of the Games, following Martin's bronze and Perez's silver in the individual 20km race walk six days ago. They won by almost a minute from Ecuador, who clocked **2:51:22** as **Brian Pintado** added silver to the gold he won in the men's 20km race walk. Australian duo **Rhydian Cowley** and **Jemima Montag** took bronze in **2:51:38**.

Held in the Trocadero area of Paris with the course looping underneath the Eiffel Tower, the race was close for the first half. Spain, led off by Martin, was part of a lead group of five for the first leg. With the leaders passing through 10km in 38:15, Germany's **Christopher Linke** got to the first hand off in pole position, covering the 11.4km stage in 43:32, just ahead of Martin, Pintado, Japan's **Masatora Kawano** and Brazil's **Caio Bonfim**, the individual 20km silver medallist.

Kimberly Garcia, the double 2022 world champion, put Peru in contention by making up a 40-second deficit in the first half of her 10km leg, drawing level with Perez and Italy's **Antonella Palmisano**, the Olympic 20km champion three years ago.

Australia's Montag and China's **Yang Jiayu**, the Olympic 20km champion, also produced a strong effort on the second leg. At the end of the second leg, Australia held a narrow lead from China, Mexico and Peru with Ecuador and Spain a few seconds behind. Palmisano, meanwhile, had drifted back.

Just one kilometre into the third leg, Martin and Pintado were back at the front of the pack, a stride ahead of Australia's Cowley. Peru, China and Mexico were all close behind. Five kilometres into the penultimate leg, Pintado and Martin were still side by side, 19 seconds ahead of Italy's **Massimo Stano**, the 20km champion in Tokyo three years ago.

Martin managed to open up a bit of distance on Pintado in the final two kilometres of his leg, giving teammate Perez a three-second lead from Ecuador's **Glenda Morejon**. Palmisano, meanwhile, started her leg in third place, 20 seconds ahead of Australia's Montag.

Perez extended Spain's lead over Ecuador with each lap on the final leg. The real drama was happening further behind, though. Half way through the final 10.8km stage, Palmisano was caught by Montag and then by Garcia.

There was no catching Perez, though, who went on to cross the line unopposed in 2:50:31, having covered the final stage in 45:51. Morejon held on to the silver medal position, crossing the line in 2:51:22 while Montag matched Perez's split time to secure bronze for Australia in 2:51:38. Peru placed fourth in 2:51:56, while Mexico's Algena Gonzalez produced the fastest split of the final stage – 45:25, 42:03 pace for 10km – to finish fifth. Italy (2:53:52), Brazil (2:54:08) and Japan (2:55:40) rounded out the top eight.

Victory marked symbolic moments for both Martin and Perez. "It was an incredible race because we knew that it would be very hard to get another Olympic medal," said Martin. "But I was with Maria, and she did the best that she could. This is amazing, this is history - not only for us but for Spanish race walking.

"I'm 30 now, and in four years' time I'll be 34, so I know this will be my last Olympic Games," added Martin. "I came here without an Olympic medal and now, thanks to Maria, I'll return to Spain with two."

Perez, meanwhile, has made Spanish athletics history.

"I feel very special because that triple crown (world, European and Olympic gold) is the first time that it has been achieved by a Spanish athlete," she said. "And I'm fortunate enough to have shared it with Alvaro."

*EMMANUEL TARDI, OLYMPIC RACE WALK JUDGES' ASSISTANT, REPORTS

There was never any doubt that our friend and French correspondent, **Emmanuel Tardi**, would stop at *rien* to involve himself in the race walking action at his country's own Olympics. Sure enough, he landed a responsible role on the judging staff at the Pont d'Iola in both the 20km races and Marathon Mixed Relay. Busy as he was in that opening week, he found time to put pen to paper and describe his experiences for H&T Online. *Merci*, Emmanuel!

The Olympic adventure began in September 2023, when most French officials received a message to apply as NTO. I absolutely wanted to be part of this adventure and so I sent my resume (?).

I also applied at that time to be a volunteer. In November, I was selected as a volunteer to take care of the tennis players at Roland-Garros.

In mid-December, I was told that I was selected as NTO for the racewalking events. I was then told that I would be responsible for the Penalty Zone.

I went to Antalya (World Team Championship), to see how the penalty zone was managed in a major competition. But the Olympic adventure really began in mid-July when I went to pick up my Olympic clothes. That's when I really began to realize what was going to happen to me.

The opening ceremony of the Olympic Games took place on Friday, July 26th, the athletics NTOs (coming from all over France, including our distant islands) were gathered on July 29th in a comfortable hotel in the north of Paris. We had a few briefings.

On July 31st everyone came to the race walk course to prepare for the competition.

On August 1st, early in the morning, the bus came to pick us up, the competition was about to begin. The storm was raging and there was lightning. It was during a final briefing that we were advised that the start time of the race was postponed. At around 7:15 am, we went to our positions.

I didn't see many spectators, because I was positioned on the bridge. One side of the bridge was reserved for coaches and the other side was a paying area, where few tickets had been sold. The public was gathered at the other end of the circuit ... and I didn't see it.

8am, it's the start, I'm relaxed, but as soon as the cards are displayed on the board, the pressure rises and I try to spot the athletes concerned. The first walker to enter the penalty zone will be the Mexican Doctor. Everything is going well, my assistants are doing their job. I'm reassured. For the 8 athletes who entered the penalty zone, there were no problems. When Ana Cabecinha (last female competitor) goes for her last lap, I tell myself that half the way is done.

This Saturday, to take my mind off things, I went to do an 8-hour walking competition 400 kilometers from Paris. On this Monday morning, I'm back at the officials' hotel waiting for the 42km relay and hoping that everything will go well.

Oui, mes amis, you read that right. Emmanuel's idea of a day off is to travel half-way across France to compete in an 8-hour walk of his own, then return for his next tour of duty. Such is his passion for the sport! And what better way of 'taking your mind off things' than to go for a nice stroll ... 46.9kms long?

OTHER NEWS

The UK athletics club Leigh Harriers, based in the Greater Manchester area, had good reason to celebrate last week. **Keely Hodgkinson**, a Leigh member from childhood, won gold in the Olympic women's 800m final with a stirring performance. What makes her feat relevant to these pages, however, is that Keely's triumph occurred 100 years after the success of another Leigh Harrier, at the Paris Olympics of 1924 (the famous 'Chariots of Fire' Games). That member was race walker **Reg Goodwin**, who won silver in the 10,000m track walk behind the charismatic Italian champion Ugo Frigerio.

Tony Taylor has put together an informative and entertaining piece on Goodwin's life and career, 'Leigh Harriers At The Olympics Across A Century 1924 to 2024, From Reg To Keely' which includes biography, archival photos and statistics.

Reg Goodwin was clearly one of the pre-eminent British heel 'n' toe men of his day. The report contains a page of his major competitive results in which it's a challenge to find much that he didn't win or get a placing in. Following his competitive career he ventured into coaching, officiating and organising at club level and nationally. Goodwin was one of


those English stalwarts who achieved highly as competitors then ploughed their acumen back into the sport, developing the next generation of walkers through a strong domestic club scene.
