THE 50KM RACEWALK IS SAVED (FOR THE MOMENT)

The good news is that our world wide campaign to keep the 50km racewalk on the international calendar and the 2020 Olympics has been successful.

The online petition (https://www.change.org/p/ioc-iaaf-keep-the-50km-race-walk-in-the-olympics) was an amazing effort, given the one week timeframe. It ensured the issue got huge amounts of sympathetic traction in the world media and, as a result of lobbying at all levels, the IAAF Council voted unanimously last Thursday against recommending any changes to the 2020 Olympic T&F program.

This was a huge exercise for the us and many people must be thanked, including our elite walkers (including Chris Erickson who setup the petition), the 9380 people who signed the petition, and the IAAF Council. But special thanks must be made to USA Attorney at Law Paul de Meester who travelled to London off his own bat, booked himself into the same hotel as the IAAF Council delegates and then caught up with and spoke to them all in the final days leading up to the vote. He presented each delegate with a superb summary document (see http://www.vrwc.org.au/documents/IAAF.pdf) and handed out out a post-conference press release (see http://www.vrwc.org.au/documents/De%20Meester%20Press%20Release.pdf) which, taken together, present a well argued and compelling case for the retention of the 50km walk and the need to work towards enhancing the event with a women's division.

I offer no thanks to the IAAF Racewalking Committee who are the ones who got us into this mess.

It was with absolute surprise that, post conference, an online article praised RW Committee president Maurizio Damilano for his spirited defence of the 50km, an action that had helped save it (see http://www.insidethegames.biz/articles/1049218/iaaf-to-keep-50km-racewalk-on-programme-for-tokyo-2020). I'm sorry — what was that I just wrote? Talk about complete hypocrisy. And others on the committee are now continuing to discuss the other issues like shoes, etc, just like it's business as usual and all is forgotten and forgiven. Sorry, folks, that is not the case. The RW Committe should hang their heads in shame and should resign enmasse. They no longer have our confidence and support. They have sold out walking. We didn't vote them in but we should vote them out!

We have won a major reprieve but not a complete victory. The immediate task remains to grow the women's 50km event so that it can truly stand on its own as a legitimate championship event. For starters, that means we need to lobby our own national federations to schedule women's national 50km racewalking championships. Countries like USA, China, GBR, etc, do this but most don't as yet. Then we need to lobby regional championships and Games to add a women's 50km, alongside or inside the mens's 50km. You can rest assured that we have won a battle only. The war against racewalking will continue.

Marciadalmondo has done a superb analysis in their latest press release (http://www.marciadalmondo.com/eng/dettagli_news.aspx?id=2771) and I will reproduce the table which shows that in the first 4 months of 2017, there have been 12 major 50km walk championships, with a total of 238 men and 25 women starting the races.

IAAF RACEWALKING CHALLENGE EVENT, TAICANG, CHINA, SATURDAY 22 APRIL

My report on the latest IAAF Racewalking Challenge event in Taicang, China, is taken from Vincent Wu's report for the IAAF (see https://www.iaaf.org/news/report/lu-bonfim-iaaf-race-walk-challenge-taicang).

20km Women

The races were staged under sunny and hot conditions with the temperature soaring over 20C after the start of the women's race at 8:00am. 23-year-old World silver medallist **Lu Xiuzhi**, who was the fastest woman on paper with a PB of 1:25:12, stayed in the leading pack together with her two teammates **Wang Na** and **Yang Jiayu** as well as Brazilian record-holder **Erica de Sena** for most of the race before charging off for the win some 500 metres before the finish. Thanks to her powerful home stretch display, the vastly experienced Lu registered a winning time of 1:31:01, edging out Yang by just three seconds. Wang finished third in 1:31:09 while De Sena took fourth in 1:31:31. It is the second victory for Lu in 2017, following her world-leading 1:26:28 performance set when winning the Chinese National Grand Prix in Huangshang last month. Now, she has already set her eyes on the IAAF World Championship London 2017 as well as the Chinese National Games, a quadrennial multi-sport competition with great importance for most Chinese athletes.

"There are only three weeks between the two competitions. I will have to deal with the jet lag after returning from London and my physical conditions may also be a problem," said Lu, who is the defending National Games 20km champion.

20km Men

Unlike the women's event that saw the pre-race favorite take the win, the men's 20km race was wide-open following a series of withdrawals by Chinese elite walkers, with Olympic champion Wang Zhen and silver medalist Cai Zelin both deciding to skip the race. Meanwhile, both the 2012 Olympic gold medalist **Chen Ding** and the in-form world leader **Wang Kaihua** only entered the Chinese National Grand Prix that was jointly held with the Challenge event in Taicang. As a result, the Chinese

team had to field the 38-year-old veteran **Han Yucheng** and relatively inexperienced **Luo Yadong** and **Li Peng** to compete in the Challenge race.

The 26-year-old Brazilian Caio Bonfim, who set his PB of 1:19:42 en route to his fourth-place finish at the Rio Olympics last year, held off Mexico's Julio Cesar Salazar to win in 1:22:16. Salazar finished 42 seconds adrift. South Africa's Lebogang Shange finished third in 1:23:45. It was the second time Shange has earned a podium finish at a challenge meet this season, following his second-place finish at the Oceania 20km Race Walk Championships in Adelaide in 1:21:00. The overall winner of the men's race was China's Wang Rui, who clocked 1:21:58 but he was only entered in the National Grand Prix team event. Neither Chen nor Kaihua managed to find their best form, as Kaihua finished fifth in 1:25:04 in the Grand Prix individual race and Chen clocked a sluggish 1:27:16 to finish 17^{th} .

The second day of competition saw the Open 50km and the U20 30km events. The start included 3 women but unfortunately none managed to finish. The 50km race also saw Yu Wei (5th place in Rio de Janeiro in 2016) having a special 35km time trial. The aim had been to produce a time around 2:28:00 but he faded a little, finishing in 2:31:52

The 30km U20 saw a win to Lu Ning (2:24:05), ahead of Wen Yongjie (2:24:27) and Li Xiaobing (2:26:43). Of the 27 starters, only 8 finished, with 15 DNF and 3 DQ.

- Athletics New Zealand has named the first 6 athletes for the 2017 IAAF World Track & Field Championships in London. The list includes **Quentin Rew** who is selected for the 50km. Quentin is also hoping for selection in the 20km, as is fellow Kiwi Alana Barber, but the AthsNZ 20km selection criteria are horrendous (1:21:00/1:21:30 and 1:30:00/1:31:00). It doesn't pay to be a NZ T&F athlete nowadays! Their standards are so tough. - Rio to host the 2020 Pan-American Masters Games apparently. "Building on the legacy of the Olympic Games Rio 2016, the organisers of the second Pan-American Masters Games which are expected to be held in the second half of 2020 and last for 9 to 10 days intend to use the Olympic venues as much as possible, including the Maracanã Stadium for the opening ceremony. This will offer a unique opportunity for Masters athletes to follow in the footsteps of Olympians. The Rio 2016 venues are currently in the process of being converted into their post-Games configurations and will be ideal venues for the Masters athletes, who will also be able to take advantage of the new hotels and tourism infrastructure that was developed ahead of Rio 2016." - The lack of progress made by Russia in anti-doping reforms has "disappointed" IAAF president Sebastian Coe. Furthermore, the taskforce concluded "it does not look like they will be met any time soon". Their concerns centre on problems with testing, the difficulties in getting biological passport samples, issues around closed cities, and the employment of coaches who were linked to tainted regimes. Portugalov was chief of the Russian Athletics Federation Medical Commission. Kazarin was the Russian national team 800m coach and Melnikov was a senior endurance coach. Finally some justice is being served on those behind the drugs program. They join disgraced walks coach Viktor Chegin who was

VALE MURRAY LAMBDEN

I was shocked this morning to read of the sudden passing of Isle of Man legend **Murray Lambden**. Since starting as a young athlete in 1970, Murray had been involved in athletics for more than 46 years, as a race walker, marathon runner, statistician, official and website coordinator for Manx Athletics and the Parish Walk. Always a huge supporter of the 85 mile Parish Walk, he won it in 1978 with a time of 16:19:37 and finished on many other occasions. In 1981 he set a British 30km racewalk record and he represented that country 4 times in 1981 and 1982. He also represented the Isle of Man in the 1982 Commonwealth Games in Brisbane, coming 8th in the 30km walk in 2:22:18. The following brief biography tells something of a life full of highs. We will all miss you mate!

MURRAY Lambden walked for the Isle of Man at the 1982 Games In Brisbane, Australia, and in 1994, was manager of the athletics squad in Victoria, Canada. Murray's passion for athletics continues unabated and he is the man behind the extremely comprehensive manxathletics.com website, on which he is a serial and entertaining blogger.

Murray says he will never forget the life-changing opportunity taking part in the Commonwealth Games gave him.

He achieved the qualifying standard for the 30km walk at the 1978 Games in Edmonton, Canada, and was encouraged by some to try and make the team.

However he felt unready for the challenge and thought the qualifying standard was too soft. In any event, three others had the qualifying time and they were all faster than him.

Uncertain for a while of the direction his sporting career was heading after a series of disappointments and the sudden death of his father Murray, then a student, says he finally got it together while walking alone through the streets of Preston while the Commonwealth Games were taking place in Canada.

He recounts: 'I decided I needed a purpose - I was going to represent the Isle of Man in the 1982 Commonwealth Games.

'When I finished my studies and returned to the Isle of Man in late June 1979, the training started. At a silly pace.

'Although pushing my body to the limit, within a month I had broken 5 hours for 50km for the first time despite doing the "double midnight." That meant taking the midnight sailing to Liverpool, hanging around in the city for several hours and taking the first train to Birmingham and on to Coventry. After walking 31 miles, the reverse journey saw me catch the overnight ferry back to Douglas and hitting my bed for the first time in 48 hours by about 6 am.

 $^{\circ}$ I started to win races, set a British record for 30km in February 1981, and represented Great Britain four times in 1981 and 1982 (Brighton, Valencia, Rome and Bielefeld).


'1982 was a long hard season with the Commonwealth Games in Brisbane in October. I wanted more than the Commonwealth Games and I tried, but failed, to make the GB team for the European Championships too.

Selection for the Commonwealth Games was by that time a formality but there was a time at the end of August when I was so exhausted that I almost

'I am so glad that I didn't. We had more than two weeks between arrival in Australia and my event and I got right back into my stride, literally. Every other day, on my hard day and his easy day, I trained with the man who won the event, Welshman Steve Barry.

*On a couple of occasions Graham Young joined us and we were photographed by the press with me pretending I was beating Steve for the title!

'I certainly didn't do everything perfectly. Although I continued to train hard I ate too much and had a few drinks too. It was the first time I had chips for breakfast! There was so much food. I would have a light breakfast before training and then a full version when I got back. Rob Elliott, the Guernsey walker, joined me a few times on those full breakfasts.
