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WALKER OF THE WEEK



The second of the Tokyo World Championships walks – the 20km – saw **Rhydian Cowley** and **Rebecca Henderson (VIC)** repeat their 35km feats of leading the Australians across the finish line for 20th and 21st places respectively, earning them join WOTW awards.

Bouncing back after a humidity-ravaged 35km the precious Saturday was always going to be a challenge. **Rhydian** ensured he was up near the leading pack early, but by 5km he was 11 secs down and aiming at minimizing the backward flow. As is typical of Rhyd, he used his second-half strength to good effect, clawing back several bigtime rivals (including early leader Dominik Cerny) to finish in **1:21:18**, only 1:07 off a top 10 placing. Another 100% effort by the never-say-die Glenhuntlian!



Bec was rightly delighted with her result, her

fastest-ever 20km in a major international (see her interview on *Australian Athletics* Facebook page) with a time of **1:31:05**. This, coming on the back of her 9th place in the 35km, indicates that her replenishment program over the ensuing week had worked in her favour and she was also able to come through the field in the second 10km. More a stayer than a sprinter, Bec was able to outlast many of her rivals as the temperature rose. An outstanding campaign from one of our most popular athletes.

*Honourable mentions:

- **Declan Tingay (WA/VIC)** Dec put himself in the mix from the outset and was only a second behind eventual bronze medallist Paul McGrath at half-way. Struck rough going in the third 5km but was able to arrest the loss of ground and finish 23rd in **1:21:30**, on a day when many big guns started with a bang and later struggled.
- Elizabeth McMillen (NSW) hurled into the furnace of a world championship competition, Lizzy would have hoped for
 better after her World University victory and record in July. But you can only counter what the day throws at you with
 what you've got, and full marks to Lizzy for gritting it out, crossing 33rd in 1:34:58.
- Tim Fraser (ACT) A hard day at the office for Tim, who nevertheless gave it his all despite what the clock was telling him, finishing 39th in 1:24:55. A day for learning and toughening in his first major international.

Alexandra Griffin (WA) – You can put in all the hard work, exercise all the self-discipline and have a race plan as close
to perfect as you like ... and it can all vanish with the roll of an ankle when you've barely left the stadium. A heartbreaking
experience for Ali, her family and supporters back at the WARWC, yet one she'll have stored in the memory bank as
'unfinished business'. We'll celebrate with you when it's finished, Ali!

Regardless of times (it took something exceptional to get close to PBs in the conditions), their results (Rhyd 20th in **1:21:18**, Bec 21st in **1:31:05**) were hard-earned, all the more since they followed big depletive efforts in the 35km the week before. Bec and Rhyd along with **Will Thompson** can now have some well-earned down time before focusing on the maiden Australian Marathon Walk championship at Stromlo Park, Canberra, in November. Well done, team!
- The **Pashutin** family had a fair(-ish) excuse for being absent from the Club's season closer and Winter presentations last week. Mum **Alla** and Dad **Ivan** were both pounding the sand on the course of the Surf Coast Century ultra-running challenge, held from Anglesea to Torquay then back via Pt Addis. PASSING THE BATON - THE GIRGIN LEGACY

I can think of many instances of where a highly performing or internationally ranked racewalking parent has been followed by a racewalking child who was just as good, if not better:

- Bert Gardiner and Bob Gardiner
- Graeme Russell and Dion Russell
- Tim Erickson and Chris Erickson
- Craig Brill and Nathan Brill
- David Smith and Dane Bird-Smith
- Jenny Billington and Tayla-Paige Billington

but few can match the story of the Girgin Family for quality and quantity.

The story started in 1969 when, at the age of 21, Zeki Girgin arrived in Australia from Turkiye as a migrant worker. Like many of our immigrants, he worked in different parts of Australia from Perth to Darwin, in the mines and in building roads.

His original intention was to work here and go back to Turkiye for family visits, but he quickly realised that the Australian way of life would be better for his daughters Ece, Ezo and Eti (all born in Turkiye) so he decided to bring his wife Fatma and his three daughters to Australia in 1989 for a better life. The family then settled permanently in Australia.

Although Zeki never had opportunity to compete in sports, he encouraged his own children to be involved in athletics and to aim for the top. This involvement started with Ece and Ezo who took up athletics while students at Melbourne Girls College in Richmond. Their first major milestones were in 1994 at the AV Schools State T&F Championships, where Ece competed in the 1500m run and Ezo in the racewalk.

The two girls joined Richmond Harriers that same year (1994) and it was Richmond Harriers who directed them towards the winter roadwalking season at the VRWC in Albert Park. Indeed, both Richmond Harriers and the VRWC encouraged and embraced the family, one of the very few of Turkish heritage in Australian athletics at that time.

Ece was the only Girgin who did not master the racewalking technique but she was gifted with natural endurance and carved a good career as a runner, challenging herself with distances up the half marathon.

While Ece and Ezo thrived in their newfound athletics careers, Eti only occasionally came to VRWC and only race walked casually. Early on, she made the decision to focus on her studies.

Eda, Timucin and Ergenekon (all born here in Australia) soon followed in the footsteps of their older sisters Ece and Ezo and joined Little Athletics at Collingwood where many of their club walk records still stand. They also joined VRWC around this time, in 1997.

Their first trip to the Lake Burley Griffin Carnival was in 1999, when Eda and Tim won their respective U9 1km roadwalks (5:36 and 5:38 respectively). Erko joined them in Canberra in 2001, with his own win in the U9 1km roadwalk (5:52). From then on up until 2003, the yearly trip to LBG in Canberra was one of their family walking highlights and they usually performed well, especially young Tim who won golds in 1999, 2001, 2002 and 2003.

In 2003, the children moved from Richmond Harriers to Athletics Essendon, the main reason being the need for a track on which to train. This led to them joining Mark Donahoo's training squad and it was Mark who guided Eda, Tim and Erko in their subsequent junior careers.

They all performed well in their various Victorian and Victorian Schools Championships, winning a whole swathe of medals in the period from 2002 till 2007.

However, like many talented youngsters before and since, they hung up their walking shoes post Year 12 and moved onto further studies. All six children successfully finished university and took on professional employment, thus fulfilling Zeki's dream of better lives for his family here in Australia.

Luckily for us, the racewalking story does not end there because Ece and Ezo reappeared at the VRWC in 2018, when **Ela Uzun** (Ece's daughter) and **Havana Ali** (Ezo's daughter) started racing at Middle Park – Ela as a 7 year old and Havana as a 6 year old.

It was immediately obvious that both Ela and Havana exhibited natural talent and that Girgin passion for race walking.

Ela quickly started to rewrite the VRWC record books, from U9 upwards. In fact her first club record was recorded after only a couple of months, with a 2018 U9 2km Roadwalk time of 13:35. Since then, she has set new VRWC club records or broken her own club records an amazing 62 times. You can check the current VRWC records listing at https://www.vrwc.org.au/vrwc-records.shtml.

It was obvious right from the start that Havana was also an excellent walker and she does not seem to be overshadowed by her older cousin. In fact, the girls have shown themselves to be wonderful training partners, always supporting each other and celebrating each other's achievements. They are undoubtedly lucky to have each other in their wonderful shared journey.

In 2022, the family felt it was time for the two young girls to test themselves further and they started competing in Senior Athletics with Athletics Essendon. It was a very special moment when both girls broke the Athletics Essendon 3000m walk record of their aunty Eda.

Now, at only 14 years of age, Ela holds every single Athletics Essendon record (both underage and Open) over the 1500m, 2000m, 3000m and 5000m walk distances. And that's just the tip of the iceberg. Her wider accolades include

- Holding just about every VRWC club record from U9 to U15 for all distances from 1500m to 5000m (some of these records are also Open club records!)
- Holding the Little Athletics Victoria 1500m Best performances for U10-U13
- Holding the Victorian U13 (13:26.86), U14 (13:21.24) and U15 (13:23.14) 3000m Track Walk Records
- Holding the Australian U16 5km Roadwalk Record (22:57)

On top of those statistics, Ela has been unbeaten in her age group in any Australian race since 2019. Her only loss came in her first interstate participation in June 2019, when she was second in the LBG U10 1km with a time of 5:14. Since then, she has been untouchable.

Ela's list of PBs reads superbly for someone who is only 14 years old

Them's big footsteps for Havana to follow but she has also made her mark, setting her own VRWC U11 5000m track record of 29:24.0.

And both girls are very strong technically. Racing prolifically, Ela has never once been disqualified, and Havana only once. I wish we could all say that about our racewalking careers.

The Girgin connection with VRWC goes back 31 years and their connection with Australian athletics goes back 35 years. It's a great story but one with a lot more to come, given what we have seen so far with Ela and Havana.

Ece, Ezo, Eti, Eda, Timucin and Ergenekon were the only Turkish background racewalkers in Austalia during their day, and I think the same can probably be said for Ela and Havana now. Proudly Turkish and proudly Australian.

Well done, girls. I look forward to reviewing this story in a few years time and adding more icing to the cake!

Perez repeats world race walk double in Tokyo

Spain's **Maria Perez** successfully defended her women's 20km race walk title on Saturday (20) to complete a historic 'double double' at the World Athletics Championships Tokyo 25, after retaining the 35km version on the opening day.

The 29-year-old from Orce finished 12 seconds clear in the Japan National Stadium in a season's best of 1:25:54, with Mexico's Alegna Gonzalez taking silver in a North American record of 1:26:06.

"I have been in five World Championships and this is my fourth medal. I am the happiest woman in the world," said Perez. "I did not come here today to make history in women's sport. I just came to improve myself and not focus on the time. I responded well to the changes in pace. I knew where my limits were. It was not easy, but I managed to have time to celebrate at the end. Last time in Japan (at the Olympics in 2021), I left with a bittersweet taste (because she finished fourth). I am leaving happy now."

All the drama was in her wake, however, as an exhausted 26-year-old **Nanako Fujii** claimed Japan's first world medal in this event after reaching the line for third place a step ahead of the fast-finishing **Paula Torres** of Ecuador. Fujii, who had fought tenaciously to remain in contact with the leaders amid packed home support on the 1km looped course, set a national record of **1:26:18**, with Torres – bronze medallist in the 35km race – being given the same time, which was a personal best for her.

It was the host country's second medal, following the bronze won by Hayato Katsuki in the men's 35km race walk.

"I have been waiting for this moment for a while and it finally happened," said Fujii, who wore a black ribbon during the race. "Winning the bronze medal in my country feels very special. I am honoured to do it at home. The colder weather today probably helped me. I am wearing the black ribbon in honour of my coach, who passed away last month. I know he is looking after me from above."

Torres had moved into fourth place during the closing stages on the track, overtaking Peru's **Kimberly Garcia Leon**, who won the 20km and 35km double when it was introduced to the World Athletics Championships at the 2022 edition in Oregon. It was a noble performance from the Peruvian, who has returned to the sport after suffering severe depression following her failure to take a medal at the Paris 2024 Games. She finished in a national record of **1:26:22**.

Sixth place went to China's world record-holder Yang Jiayu, who beat Perez to the Olympic title in Paris last summer. Yang clocked a season's best of 1:27:16, with Spain's Antia Chamosa following her home in 1:27:55 and her compatriot Wu Quanting earning eighth place in 1:28:08.

With the race walking distances changing to half marathon and marathon after the Tokyo championships, Perez will thus be the women's 20km race walk world champion in perpetuity.

After discarding her white cap as she entered the stadium, she pushed her sunglasses up to her brow as she entered the final straight in order to take in the full spectacle. Having beaten her chest in triumph, she addressed the TV camera with a message for her 34-year-old training partner **Antonella Palmisano** of Italy, the Tokyo Olympic gold medallist in 2021. The victorious Spaniard had embraced her friend at the 35km finish line after she followed her home for silver. But on this occasion Palmisano was unable to add a 20km medal to the bronze she earned in 2023 as she dropped out of the race shortly after the halfway mark.

Perez, peerless, had bossed the race from the start in conditions that were far fresher than those which had obtained during the 35km racing, which took place in high humidity.

The defending champion reduced the number of medal contenders with a series of surges, the first of which came between the fifth and sixth kilometre, which created a lead group of 12. At the 10km mark the group had been reduced to seven, with Perez and Leon going through in 43:37 ahead of Yang, Gonzalez, Fujii, Wu and Torres.

By 15km Perez was pushing on, leading in 1:04:59 along with Gonzalez. Fujii and Leon were 0.01 behind and Wu was dropping away. One kilometre later the shape of the race had become clearer as Perez began moving clear on 1:09:09, three seconds ahead of Gonzalez and Fujii, with Leon a further three seconds back. At 18km gold appeared destined for Perez as she led Gonzalez by nine seconds, with Fujii four seconds further back but a full 10 seconds clear of Leon.

The Peruvian rallied in the penultimate kilometre, however, moving to within three seconds of the straining home athlete as the field prepared for the stadium finale. But Leon could not sustain her challenge in the closing stages. And Fujii, who collects Winnie the Pooh merchandise, was soon bounding about like Tigger as she registered the full significance of her achievement in an arena full of adoring fans.

Gold at last for 20km race walk winner Bonfim in Tokyo

In crossing the finish line in **1:18:35** at the World Athletics Championships Tokyo 25 on Saturday (20), Brazil's **Caio Bonfim** claimed gold in the 20km race walk just a week after winning silver at the 35km distance.

"Your father is a world champion," he said to the camera afterwards, sending a message to his children: Miguel, Theo and Manoel.

With heavy breathing and backward glances every 30 seconds on his approach to the Japan National Stadium, Bonfim overtook three contenders during the last lap to claim his title.

"I overtook the Chinese and Spanish athletes on the last lap, but I thought I was second and accelerated to try to win a medal," he said, only learning of his win when crossing the finish line.

He threw himself on the track, wrapped in the finish line tape, the realisation of his gold medal showing through incredulous eyes.

"I lost my wedding ring in the third kilometre. I believe my wife will be OK because I won today," he said. "The oldest of my three children, Miguel, told me he missed me. I said that my success could compensate for my absence. I am here for him and I made sure my effort was worthy of him."

Bonfim already had two major international silver medals and two bronze, and now he owns a first global gold. Japan's world record-holder **Toshikazu Yamanishi** tops the world ranking this season and he led for much of the second

half of the race, but was hit with a two-minute time penalty, taking him out of contention. Bonfim, whose strategy had been to stick with Yamanishi, then took up the lead with a few kilometres to go.

"I am very disappointed," Yamanishi said. "I wish I had been more careful during the race. I wanted to win the gold medal, so I pushed for it. I had to go for it but that led me to disqualification. I don't know what to do now. To win in Tokyo was one of my big goals. I need to think about my next steps."

China's **Wang Zhaozhao** came right after Bonfim, clocking **1:18:43** for the silver – his first World Championships medal after winning at the Asian Championships in May and claiming silver in the Asian Games in 2023. He was ranked eighth heading into the race.

"I knew I would be fighting the strongest race walkers in the world and the temperature, so I moved to a training camp in Yuanjiang in Yuannan Province for a whole month," Wang explained. "It is a small city with a very similar climate to Tokyo. This competition was my main focus this year. This is my first big international medal, so I couldn't be happier about the result."

Spain's Paul McGrath finished just two seconds later, clocking 1:18:45 for the bronze, his first medal at a World Championships. "A dream come true," he said.

His pace dropped as he suffered with cramps in the final kilometre, but he held on to a podium place, climbing from seventh place in the world ranking to celebrate the second medal of the day for Spain, following Maria Perez's gold in the women's race just hours earlier.

"When the leader Toshikazu Yamanishi got disqualified, I was very scared I would get disqualified too," he admitted. "I had two cards at that moment. I was just thinking that winning a medal is better than not winning one at all, so I calmed down, got my race technique under control, and finished with bronze. I will go for the gold next time."
