** WALKER OF THE WEEK **



For the second successive week, the AVSL competition has provided our WOTW. Last week it was Ela Uzun. This week, it's the turn of Diamond Valley AC walker **Max Davidson (VIC).**

A promising speedster in Little Athletics for several years, Max put in his first full season of road racing with the VRWC in 2024 and the results are obvious. On Saturday at Keilor Park, Max ripped 27secs from his previous 2000m best for a dominant win, clocking **8:36.8**. This followed his PB result of 13:37 over 3000m at Doncaster last weekend.

Having wisely concentrated on building speed and strength at distances up to 6km during the winter, Max has laid the groundwork for a summer of fast results in key competitions such as next weekend's All Schools and the various age group track championships of early 2025, not to mention further improvement in AVSL meetings. If he races in the national schools and junior championships next year he will provide formidable opposition.

Well done, Max. We wish you a successful summer of racing and further PBs.

VRWC Summer races #1, 20 October – Middle Park

The first of our club summer race Sundays saw 19 starters toe the line in largely fine and mild conditions. **Kelly Ruddick**, on the comeback trail, fought through a painful shoulder condition to complete the 15km event, while **Alejandro Stephens** added a fair 10km hit-out to his 2000m PB of the day before at AVSL. For **Emilie Garside** it was a bumper weekend – two PBs, one at AVSL over 2000m plus a bigger improvement at 3km. Emilie is now showing the benefit of a consistent winter road season and should improve her speed further over the summer.

Times on the day were generally slower than usual although **Dimitri Pashutin** bucked the trend, coming to within 8 secs of his 1km PB. It was a pleasant surprise to see **John Nottle** back in harness after his recent health scare, prudently electing to walk the 1km for **6:18**. Newcomer **Aangi Shah** raced her first ever 3km, clocking **21:19** which was a creditable effort, and we look forward to seeing her at Middle Park again.

JAPAN: 78th National Sports Festival, 11-15 October - Saga

Satoshi Maruo and Ayane Yanai win at Japan Games

In Saga, a Japanese city on the island of Kyushu, the 78th edition of the Japan National Games took place, an important annual event that included 38 sports, including athletics, held from the 10th to the 15th of this month on the Saga Stadium track in Sunrise Park.

The high level of results achieved in the race walking events is noteworthy, with Satoshi Maruo from Aichi, bronze medallist in the 20 km at this year's Asian Games in Nomi (17/3) achieving 38:43.63 in the men's 10,000 metres, just 3 seconds off his personal best and showing himself to be in very good condition for the national championships in Takahata on the 27th. He was followed by Kento Yoshikawa from Kanagawa, who accompanied him until about halfway through the race, finishing second with 39:06.64. In third place was Kazuki Takahashi from Iwate, with 39:07.95.

In the women's 5,000 meters, the dominant event was Ayane Yanai, a 20-year-old athlete from Fukuoka, who added a new personal best of 21:14.06 to her triumph. Second and third places were taken by Yukiko Umeno, from Chiba, with 21:59.94, and Hitomi Shimoka, from Osaka, with 22:06.46.

The program included a race for under-19 boys over 5,000 meters, which was also very competitive (the top nine runners all achieved times in the 20-minute range). **Daichi Yamada** (17) from Hyogo was the winner in **20:17.88**, followed by Souichiro Nakajima (18) from Hiroshima in 20:25.68 and Toshiya Inoue (16) from Nagano in 20:38.25.

FURTHERMORE ...

It was 60 years ago that the 50km walk of the Tokyo 1964 Olympic Games took place (reprinted from O Marchador – 18 October)

In the first edition of the Olympic Games held in an Asian country, Japan hosted the event and symbolically designated **Yoshinori Sakai** as the bearer of the Olympic flame, as he was born in Hiroshima on August 6, 1945, the day the atomic bomb hit his city, in homage to the victims and embodying a call for world peace.

Today (October 18) marks the 60th anniversary of the **Men's 50km race walk**, an event that saw the participation of 34 athletes representing 19 countries from 5 continents, on a route that ran around the National Stadium and the Koshu Kaido Fuchu. **Tadamasa Ejiri**, a pioneer of the sport in Japan, was the best representative, finishing 22nd. Today, Japan is one of the world's leading athletes in the sport.

On a day of continuous rain in the Japanese capital, the Italian **Abdon Pamich**, who had held the world record for the distance in 1960 and had won the bronze medal at the Games that same year and the European title in 1962, was naturally one of the favourites to win. And he did not disappoint expectations, setting a new Olympic record and proving himself to be one of the greatest world walkers of all time.

The silver medal was won by the British **Paul Nihill**, who led the event, and the bronze medal was won by the Swedish **Ingvar Pettersson**.

Dan Lawson's Record-breaking Land's End to John O'Groats Run

David Ainsworth sent through this link to a YouTube clip, 'Breaking Ten' that might be of interest to anyone who is intrigued by long-distance endurance feats.

Featuring British ultra-runner **Dan Lawson**, it's a 30min film clip of the Lands End-to-John O'Groats* run - when Richard Brown's record was broken by 5 hours, in 2020.
